The aim of the workshop is to help students to tackle methodological challenges in their ongoing PhD research. Prior to the seminar, students are asked to provide a short summary of their research and describe the methodological issues they are presently struggling with.

Katarina does research in political rhetoric, mainly from critical discourse analytical perspectives. Her core areas of interest lie in nationalist and radical right-wing political rhetoric, political hate-speech and online political communication.
